Maria is as charmingly rambunctious as the children. There is an enchanting pas de deux on a bicycle. And, of course, the Captain is stirringly emotive while singing Austria's favorite song, "Edelweiss."

But let's be clear-this is not some saccharine rehash of the movie. It's a freshly realized production that sharply contrasts the blossoming romance and the innocent children of the first act with the emerging menace of the Nazi regime. The moment the swastika banners are unfurled is heart-wrenching and makes the von Trapps' ultimate escape even more triumphant than it is on screen.

You shouldn't miss any of these moments!



Talking Scenic Design and Music at The Sound of Music Designer Brunch

"The Sound of Music. Really?" thought scenic designer Paul Tate dePoo III when Michael Donald Edwards called him about the gig. Despite his lack of immediate enthusiasm, he signed on for the project. Josh Rhodes was directing, after all, and their prior collaborations for Evita and Josephine had been both successful and creatively satisfying.

Having made this confession, it meant much more when dePoo told the brunch attendees, "I can't remember when I've been this excited about a production maybe never." In fact, he's so enthused that his mother is flying down from Boston to see the musical.

DePoo says Rhodes' vision for the show was to make it "different from what people expect without reinventing it." The predesign discussions included a lot of talk about Maria being "over the walls of the abbey." DePoo built on that concept in his design, which features an ambiguous fresco wall that serves as the backdrop for the church, the abbey, the interior of the von Trapp home and the landscape. The results are glorious.

As a bit of an aside, dePoo had a surprising response to Dramaturg James Monaghan's question about how he became interested in theater. He grew of performance happen.

The brunch also featured Music Supervisor Sinai Tabak. Like dePoo, Tabak has worked on several productions at Asolo Rep, including Evita and Guys and Dolls. But he's previously been in the role of Music Director. We learned that's an entirely different job from serving as Music Supervisor.

A show's Music Director plays the piano, conducts the orchestra and teaches the musicians and actors their parts. The director is on site from the first day of rehearsal to closing night.

As Music Supervisor for The Sound of Music, Tabak had the Herculean task of

up in Key West, and his parents took him on an annual outing to Miami for a performance by either the Ringling Circus or David Copperfield. DePoo remembers coming home and, at the tender age of four, trying to figure out the logistics of the shows. Clearly, he was destined for a career making the magic

converting the orchestration from a work for a 30 piece orchestra to one containing a mere ten members. As I understood it, this involves going through the music and identifying every single note that each instrument plays. Tabak said-with a smile-that it took him eight-ten hours to arrange the 45 second dance break in "Sixteen Going on Seventeen." Wow.

Tabak explained that music directors often rely heavily on synthesizers when creating new arrangements. One keyboard might "play" as many as ten string instruments. But Tabak decided to go with a more acoustic approach for The Sound of Music. The audience will hear more guitar than usual. There will also be piano, an instrument not in the original orchestration.

In sharp contrast to when serving as Music Director, Tabak's only time spent "in the room" for the show had been a couple of weeks earlier to rehearse with the orchestra. At that point, he made some changes so the music would be consistent with the way he heard it in his head. Having sat in on the run-through the prior evening-the first in which the orchestra joined the actors-he was full of excitement.

"I'm always inspired by seeing what Josh Rhodes does," he said. Tabak noted one moment during which he was struck by the way Maria looks at Captain von Trapp. A violin solo was clearly required. The change was incorporated in time for opening night.

As always, it was a treat to hear directly from key members of the production team who aren't often front and center. I can't wait to see-and hear-their work onstage.
