### GUILD PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

### A Woman's Place...

Into The Breeches! by George Brant is the third play of the repertory season and the second show directed by a woman. That woman, Laura Kepley, is the Artistic Director of The Cleveland Play house. She is no stranger to the Asolo, having directed The Heidi Chronicles here a few years ago.

It is rare to have the playwright present, but since Brant and Kepley have been married for the past seventeen years, they came to Sarasota as a duo. At a recent gathering they imparted some fascinating insights into the creation of this play.

Brant, interested in the history of World War II wondered how his art form might have helped build morale on the home front. In his research he came across a book of letters written by women to their men at war. The women wrote of their struggles to take on new roles in the home and in the workplace. The government urged women to replace the men in factories as part of the war effort. (Did you know the government sponsored daycare so women could leave their children? The program ended shortly after the war did.)

But there are all types of workplaces. In Breeches!. Brant has created a fictional community where some very determined women recast a local production of Henry V with all female players. This allows for many comedic turns, such as when a woman balances a crown on



her head while exhorting others wielding swords and shields to charge into the breaches "for Harry and for England." (This declaration might be a bit funnier than Brant intended in light of recent events at Buckingham Palace.)

Director Kepley thinks the play is most compelling as the women grow in confidence and find affirmation and a new degree of self-esteem. They take command of the stage and, ultimately, of their lives. In another letter from the book a woman writes to her husband and says, "I am not the same as I was when you left. I have changed and I will continue to work."

For those of us who know about World War II, only from books and movies, this play is a revelation of America on the brink of transformation. And speaking of transformation, Peggy Roeder, one of Asolo's favorite actors, is one of these "ordinary housewives." It is quite a change from her role as Princess Dragomiroff in Murder on The Orient Express. And Tina Stafford, the showstealing, much divorced, wise-cracking Mrs. Hubbard from the Orient Express morphs into a totally different character in Breeches!. It's all part of the fascination of repertory theatre.

It should be quite a ride!

### Setting the Stage for *Murder on the Orient Express*

Designers are the unsung heroes of a theater production. They are responsible for creating the trappings of the alternative universe in which actors and audience members find themselves, if only for a short time. Asolo Rep's Designer Brunches offer theatergoers the opportunity to hear from a show's designers firsthand. On a recent morning, dramaturg James Monaghan led a lively discussion with scenic designer Paul Tate dePoo III and costume designer Tracy Dorman about their work on *Murder on the Orient Express*.

Dorman's work on the show is her seventh engagement at Asolo Rep. Her favorite part of her work comes when collaborating with the actors in the fitting room. "The real joy," she said, "is in helping them find their characters." Take, for instance, her time with Jim DeVita, who plays the persnickety Hercule Poirot. Dorman and DeVita spent time talking about details the audience might not notice but that help build Poirot's identity, like how his pocket watch should be placed and how his handkerchief would be folded. The finessing doesn't end until opening night.


When asked about the importance of tech night, Dorman laughed and shared a small snafu. One of DeVita's wardrobe changes didn't make it onto the schedule, and he ended up on the opposite wing from his clothes. He gamely went on, appearing onstage halfdressed.

The Theatre's production of *Orient Express* uses video to a number of ends, including providing the backstory that sets the play in motion. Dorman was slightly apprehensive when she realized just how much video there would be. Her costumes are, after all, designed for the stage rather than the screen.

Having seen the final product, Dorman is a huge fan of the video component. She marveled at how much complexity it adds to the story. "I probably shouldn't say this, but the writing of the show almost doesn't deserve this level of beauty," Dorman opined. It was the perfect segueway to dePoo's scenic design.

When Michael Donald Edwards called dePoo and said, "Dahling, *Orient Express*," dePoo had to give it some serious thought. Marked across his January and February calendar in bold print were the words **"Make Sure It's Worth It."** It's often difficult, he explained, for people to get back into the groove post-holidays. An opening scheduled for early January was fraught with opportunities for disaster.

But having seen the original production of Ken Ludwig's adaptation at another theater, dePoo knew he could do better. That design included three separate train cars and left him feeling exhausted.

the result of an all-nighter he pulled after the design team met with director Peter Amster back in May. It is about as diametrically opposed to an abstraction as you can imagine. DePoo said he had to apologize to the production team responsible for creating the train cars. They had breathed a sigh of relief when he told them early on that no wood detail would be required. Oops!

Dorman and dePoo were in agreement as to their favorite element of the show — a scene that takes place on the train's observation deck. In a show jampacked with action and movement, it's a quiet moment when lights sparkle and a character turns and reveals the lowcut back of her dress. Dorman said, "It's cinematic, but it's magic. And that's theater. That is why we go to the theater."




